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Introduction

Leeds Conservatoire has a common law duty of care to ensure, so far as is reasonably practicable, the health, safety and welfare of all vulnerable individuals and groups accessing its services and facilities. The conservatoire is mindful of this duty and legal obligations, such as those it owes under the Safeguarding Vulnerable Groups Act 2006, the Freedom of Protections Act 2012 and the Counter Terrorism and Security Act 2015.

The conservatoire has two separate sets of policies and procedures, to ensure that an age appropriate approach is adopted in all cases. These are:

- 1) Safeguarding Policy for HE Students
- 2) Safeguarding Policy for Leeds Junior Conservatoire Students

The conservatoire's safeguarding arrangements are underpinned by the key principles that:

- All individuals have a right to be protected from abuse regardless of their age, gender, disability, culture, language, race, religious beliefs or sexual orientation;
- The welfare of the individual is of paramount importance
- Everyone has a responsibility to safeguard students;
- Everyone working with students maintains an attitude of 'it could happen here' (Keeping Children Safe in Education, September 2020).

Definitions

Executive Leadership Team (ELT) comprised of Principal and Vice Principal.

Abuse – when someone causes a person harm ort distress. Definitions and Indicators of abuse are detailed in Appendix 1 of the Safeguarding Procedures

Safeguarding is the action that is taken to promote the welfare of individuals and protect them from harm.

PREVENT forms part of the UK's overall counter terrorism strategy which is called CONTEST; it focusses on supporting and protecting vulnerable individuals who may be at risk of being exploited by radicalisers and subsequently drawn into terrorist related activity. PREVENT is not about race, religion or ethnicity, the programme is to prevent the exploitation of susceptible people.

Radicalisation is defined as the process by which people come to support terrorism and violent extremism and, in some cases, to then participate in terrorist groups. The process of radicalisation is different for every individual and is a process, not a one-off event; it can take place over an extended period or within a very short time frame. It is important that staff are able to recognise possible signs and indicators of radicalisation.

'Prevent' Risk Assessment

Channel is part of the Prevent strategy. The process is a multi-agency approach to identify and provide support to individuals who are at risk of being drawn into terrorism.

Upskirting is a term used to describe the act of taking a sexually intrusive photograph up someone's skirt without their permission; it is usually performed without their permission. Under the Voyeurism (Offences) Act of 2019 it is now a criminal offence.

Policy

Leeds Conservatoire has a statutory and moral duty to ensure that it safeguards and promotes the welfare of all conservatoire users, with particular reference to those studying at the conservatoire.

- Manage the impact and any communication to the wider student population

- Managing clear and appropriate engagement with all parties involved
- Ensuring access to support services for staff and students where needed
- Adopting a consistent whole institution approach
